

TRANSITION SKILLS SUMMARY (TSS)

STARK COUNTY – SPRING 2018 REPORT

The Stark County TSS – a collaborative effort of Stark County early childhood educators – is funded through the support of the Stark Education Partnership along with leadership from the Early Childhood Resource Center and State Support Team 9 (SST9). TSS is a snapshot of a child’s readiness for kindergarten using 47 key developmental skills within five domains and indicates what a child needs to accomplish before entering kindergarten. **The following is a summary of the 58 sites that completed the TSS and the average performance levels of students in Stark County in the spring of 2018.**

2,065 students participated in the TSS

70 sites registered for the TSS

12 sites did not complete the TSS

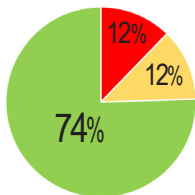

Children work/play independently, follow classroom rules and participate in group settings.

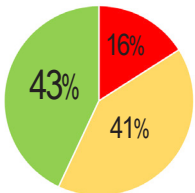

Communication and literacy skills form the foundation for reading, writing and understanding texts.

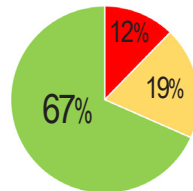

Children develop appropriate social skills and self-regulation. Students understand emotions and manage changes and conflict

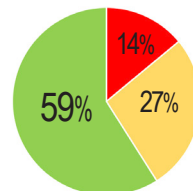

COGNITION & GENERAL KNOWLEDGE

Children develop a number sense (counting, comparing & sorting). Children also know shapes and colors, and can find solutions to problems.

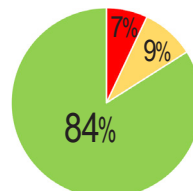


STARK **59%**
