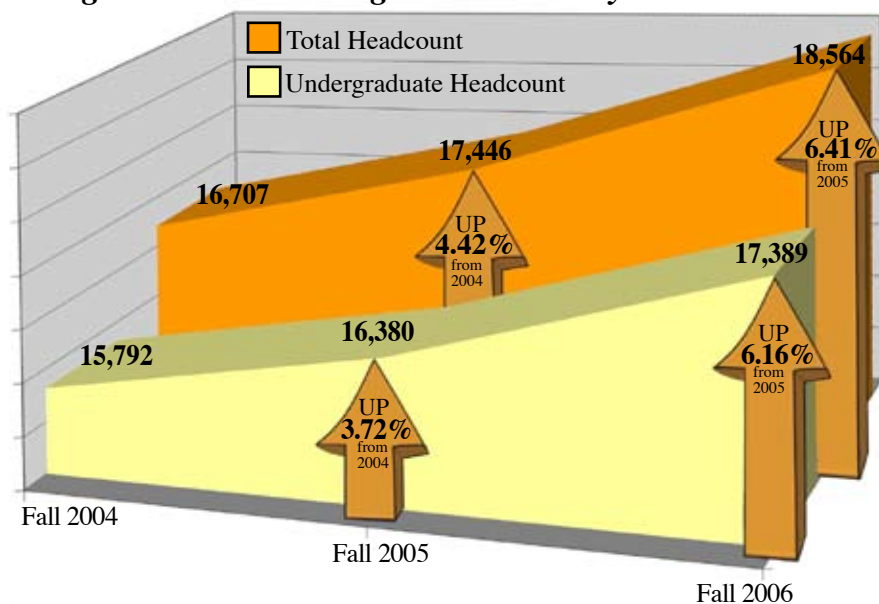
### Gaining Ground: Stark County Meets the Challenge

The Governor's Commission on Higher Education and the Economy, outlined a serious problem in Ohio (*Building on Knowledge, Investing in People*, April 2004): "Today our state is losing ground in training knowledge workers and in creating the high skill, high wage jobs that will be used to measure our prosperity in the 21st century."

Higher education was seen by the commission as part of the solution to the problem: "Ohio will achieve higher education's full potential to create more and better jobs for the state's citizens, increase economic competitiveness and fuel economic growth."

Specifically, the goal is that by the year 2015, undergraduate and graduate enrollment in Ohio's public and private postsecondary institutions will increase by 180,000 or 30% over 2003 enrollment. That target will be reached with an average growth of 3% each year. Recent enrollment reports from college and universities demonstrate that Stark County is meeting the challenge of the commission to increase enrollment in postsecondary institutions:
